The Uniform Grant is a means tested benefit, issued annually, intended to assist you in providing a basic school uniform for your children. The amount of grant you receive is calculated with reference to your annual household income and allowed expenses.

Attendance

Whole school attendance in this academic year has been just over 90%. The primary class with the highest attendance is Reception, with 92.4%%; the secondary form with the highest attendance was Year 11, with 90.9%. Our whole school attendance target is 95%.

Please note that Guernsey Education Services and schools seek to provide high standards and high expectations for all to enable our learners to realise their full potential. Education Services' expectation is that all students will achieve an attendance of at least 95%

Although Guernsey law does not preclude term time holidays, they are not a right. Absence for a holiday negatively impacts a child's attendance at school and, as such, Education Services does not approve of them. It is, therefore, the position of Education Services that holidays in term time will **not** be authorised. If you do intend to take children on holiday during term time, please complete and submit the 'Holiday Form' which can be downloaded from our website, or collect a paper copy from the school office.
